Back to School Thoughts (Metropolitan Joseph):

"You see, children, for those who have them, no matter how big the tensions might be and the hardships of daily life, when they get home and see them, all the worries and all the weaknesses go away, because of the child's joy...

But what does the child have? The child has a lot of inner peace, because there is no cunning in the child. And when the child is also baptized, he is the perfect icon of Christ born in the manger in Bethlehem.

But the child also has an interior light that we cannot explain. You've seen how kids sleep, with their arms open as on the cross. The grown-ups can't sleep like that... We have the impression that grown-ups are so hunched from worries and everything they have inside..."

Once on Mount Athos there was a monk who lived in Karyes. He drank and got drunk every day and was the cause of scandal to the pilgrims. Eventually he died and this relieved some of the faithful who went on to tell Elder Paisios that they were delighted that this huge problem was finally solved.

Father Paisios answered them that he knew about the death of the monk, after seeing the entire battalion of angels who came to collect his soul. The pilgrims were amazed and some protested and tried to explain to

the Elder of whom they were talking about, thinking that the Elder did not understand.

Elder Paisios explained to them: "This particular monk was born in Asia Minor, shortly before the destruction by the Turks when they gathered all the boys. So as not to take him from their parents, they would take him with them to the reaping, and so he wouldn't cry, they just put raki* into his milk in order for him to sleep. Therefore he grew up as an alcoholic. There he found an elder and said to him that he was an alcoholic. The elder told him to do prostrations and prayers every night and beg the Panagia to help him to reduce by one the glasses he drank.

After a year he managed with struggle and repentance to make the 20 glasses he drank into 19 glasses. The struggle continued over the years and he reached 2-3 glasses, with which he would still get drunk."

The world for years saw an alcoholic monk who scandalized the pilgrims, but God saw a fighter who fought a long struggle to reduce his passion.

Without knowing what each one is trying to do what he wants to do, what right do we have to judge his effort?

ARE WE "WORTHY" OF HOLY COMMUNION?

From Coffee with Sister Vassa (Monday, September 18)

"I believe and confess, Lord, that You are truly the Christ, the Son of the living God, Who came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am the first. I also believe that this is truly Your pure Body and that this is truly Your precious Blood. Therefore, I pray to You, have mercy upon me, and forgive my transgressions, voluntary and involuntary, in word and deed, in knowledge and in ignorance. And make me worthy/proper (ἀξίωσὸν με), without condemnation, to partake of Your pure mysteries for the remission of sins and for eternal life..." (Byzantine Liturgy, Pre-Communion Prayer)

Now, you may disagree with me, but I find the English word "worthy" in the context of receiving Holy Communion, utterly confusing, unhelpful, and even unorthodox. It seems to pose a question about my "worth" in the eyes of a Lord Who has already died for all of us, "while we were still sinners" (Rom 5: 8); and Who said to each and every one of us, "Drink from it, ALL of you..." (Mt 26: 27). Undoubtedly, He already decided that each and every one of us was "worth" that.

So, I understand the expression, "make me worthy" (ἀξίωσον με, сподоби мя), to mean "make me proper" or "right" for this occasion. In

other words, make my heart and mind appropriate for communion with You, meaning, at peace with You and others, despite my shortcomings and resulting conflicts, which I must take care to resolve before approaching You (as we are commanded to do in Mt 5: 23-24, "If you bring your gift to the altar, and there remember that your brother has something against you..."). After all, we translate the same Greek word ($\alpha\xi$ IOC) at the beginning of the Eucharistic Prayer, "A ξ IOV к α I δ α IK α IOV, / Достойно и праведно есть" as, "It is 'proper' and right."

So, when I "examine myself," as St. Paul instructs us to do, before approaching Holy Communion (1 Cor 11: 28), let me ask the right questions, rather than the false ones. I do not ask myself whether I am "worth" the Self-Offering of the precious Body and Blood of my Lord Jesus Christ on the Cross. No. Because He already answered that question, having died for me, and all of us, and having descended into our hell and overcome it, in His resurrection. What I need to ask of myself, and what He asks of me, is that my heart and mind, despite my shortcomings, are "properly" in line with His peace and His mercy, embracing forgiveness of myself and others. Lord, have it Your way; Have "mercy"! And let me have it as well, that I may be "proper" and "right" as I approach communion with You.

He will cover you with his feathers, and under his wings you will find refuge (Psalm 91)
