THE LITTLE THINGS IN LIFE Saint John Maximovitch



Many people believe that to live according to the faith and to fulfill the will of God is very difficult. Actually—it's very easy. One needs only attend to details, to trifles, and try to avoid evil in the slightest and most trivial things. This is the simplest and surest way to enter the world of the Spirit and draw near to God. A man often thinks that the Creator demands great things of him, that the Gospel insists on complete self-sacrifice, the abolition of one's personhood, etc., as a condition of faith. A man is so frightened by this that he begins to be afraid of becoming acquainted with God, of drawing near to God, and hides himself from God, not even wishing to look into God's Word. "If I can't do anything important for God, then I'd just better stay away from things spiritual, stop thinking about eternity, and live "in a normal way."

There exists at the entrance to the spiritual realm a "hypnosis of great deeds: "one must either do some big thing or do nothing. And so people do nothing at all for God or for their souls! It is very strange—the more a man is devoted to the little things of life, the less he wishes to be honest or pure or faithful to God in those same little things. And, moreover, each one must adopt a correct attitude toward little things if one wishes to come near to the Kingdom of Heaven.

Wishes to come near: In this is summed up all the difficulties of the religious life. Often one wishes to enter into the Kingdom of Heaven quite unexpectedly, in some miraculous and magical way, or, by right—through some kind of great feat. But neither the one nor the other is the right way

to find the higher world. One does not enter God's presence in some wondrous manner while remaining indifferent on earth to the needs of the Kingdom of God and its bright eternity, nor can one purchase the treasures of the Kingdom of God by some kind of eternal act, however great that act might be. Yet good deeds, holy deeds are necessary for one to grow into a higher life, a bright will, a good desire, a heavenly psychology, a heart that is both pure and fair.

A glass of water: "Verily, verily I say unto you that whosoever offers one of the least of these but a cup of cold water, in the name of a disciple, shall not lose his reward." In this saying of the Lord is the highest expression of the smallest of the good. "A glass of water"—this is not much.

Communicating in good spirit: In every communication between people there must without fail be a good spirit: this spirit is Christ, openly manifest or hidden. "In the name of a disciple": this is the first step in communicating with another person in the name of Jesus Christ Himself. Many people, not as yet knowing the Lord and the wondrous fellowship in His Name still have among themselves an unselfish, pure and human fellowship which brings them ever closer to the Spirit of Christ.

The lesser good is necessary: As a matter of fact, the lesser good is more necessary for mankind than the greater. People can get along with their lives without the greater good; without the lesser they cannot exist. Mankind perishes not from a lack of the greater good, but from an insufficiency of just this lesser good. The greater good is no more than a roof, erected on the brick walls of the lesser good.

The lesser, easier good was left on this earth for man by the Creator Himself, who took all the greater good upon Himself. Whosoever does the lesser, the same creates—and through him the Creator Himself creates—the greater good. Of our little good the Creator makes His Own great good. For as our Lord is the Creator Who formed all things from nothingness, so is He more able to create the greater good from the lesser.

Through such lesser, easy work, done with the greatest simplicity, a man is accustomed to the good and begins to serve it with his whole heart, sincerely, and in this way enters into an atmosphere of good, lets down the roots of his life into new soil, the soil of the good. The roots of human life quickly accommodate themselves to this good earth, and soon cannot live without it... Thus is a man saved: from the small comes the great. "Faithful in little things" turns out to be "faithful in the greater."

Our moral sense: Lay aside all theoretical considerations that it is forbidden to slaughter millions, women, children, and elderly; be content to manifest your moral sense by in no way killing the human dignity of your neighbor, neither by word, nor by innuendo, nor by gesture. Do not be angry over trifles "against your brother vainly" (St. Matthew 5:22) or in the daily contacts of life speak untruth to your neighbor. These are trifles, small change, of no account; but just try to do this and you will see what comes of it.

Prayer: It is hard to pray at night. But try in the morning. If you can't manage to pray at home than at least as you ride to your place of employment to attempt with a clear head the "Our Father" and let the words of this short prayer resound in your heart. And at night commend yourself with complete sincerity into the hands of the Heavenly Father. This indeed is very easy.

And give, give a glass of cold water to everyone who has need of it; give a glass filled to the brim with simple human companionship to everyone that lacks it, the very simplest companionship...

"O wondrous path of little things, I sing thee a hymn! Surround yourselves, O people, gird up yourselves with little works of good—with a chain of little, simple, easy, and good feelings which cost us naught, a chain of bright thoughts, words and deeds. Let us abandon the big and the difficult. That is for them that love it and not for us for whom the Lord in His Mercy, for us who have not yet learned to love the greater, has poured forth the lesser love everywhere, free as water and air."

God's Will

Matthew 6:10- Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. (KJV)

The Lord's Prayer is always very dear to the hearts of serious Christian believers. God's will is completely integral to the Lord's Prayer and requires careful thought. Each believer needs to consider God's will being done on earth each day of life. Having God's will be the guide for each believer is the daily challenge of life. Christians are required to address putting God's will first and foremost in life. The heart and mind are to fully desire, freely welcome and embrace God's will.

Matthew 26:42-He went away again the second time, and prayed, saying, O my Father, if this cup may not pass away from me, except I drink it, thy will be done. (KJV)

The Lord Jesus Christ is the Christian's foremost guide in accepting God's will. Christians draw courage from the Lord when facing life's most difficult decisions. Complete confidence rests in following God's will when making hard choices. Joy emanates from knowing that following God's will is always most beneficial. Confidence replaces hesitancy once the decision is made to embrace God's will. God's reassurance is manifested when decisions made are pleasing to the Lord.

Hebrews 10:7-Then said I, Lo, I come (in the volume of the book it is written of me,) to do thy will, O God. (KJV)

Daily interactions reveal when the believer ardently desires to embrace God's will. Thoughts, behavior, and daily actions demonstrate the truth in the believer's heart. Whether the Lord's Prayer is taken seriously by the believer soon becomes evident. Lukewarm commitment to adhering to the Lord's will results in half-heartedness. Christians being less than fervent in faith are not viewed well by the Lord. (Rev.3:16) Fervency in faith is consistent with welcoming God's will as life's primary guide.

Hebrews 10:9-Then said he, Lo, I come to do thy will, O God. He taketh away the first, that he may establish the second. (KJV)

Unity in mind with the Lord God is necessary to welcome and follow God's will. Careful and attentive prayer prior to each action facilitates following God's will. Believers having the Lord foremost in mind reduce putting the soul in great peril. Patience is necessary in turning to the Lord God for guidance in daily actions. Listening carefully for directions from God provides the certainty for steps to take. Attentive listeners seek to follow God's will and avoid the dangers of self-will.

She is the kind of girl you might meet at Walmart or Target. She has tattoos and piercings and maybe two or three colors in her hair. If you get a chance to talk to her, you find that she's not stupid and she even has some things to say about God and religion. Though she's had a number of relationships, she's not married but living with her boyfriend. She has several children and there is a third one on the way. They call her "Pho," which is short for Photini. I ask her if she is Greek, and she smiles and says that she is just a little Greek. She has some Russian friends who call her Svetlana.

She is a member of a growing group called "Nones." If ask to check a box about religious affiliation, she marks, "**none** of the above." She is a product of her time and like so many of her generation, she is a "spiritual" person. She wants little to do with organized religion. When you try to explain Orthodoxy to her, it sounds to her like the epitome of organized religion. What do you say to such a girl? How do you reach her?

We might take a clue from the Master. He met a Photini at the well and it changed her life. From the story, we can figure out a few things about her. She came to the well at a time when the other women were not present. Obviously, she was not well thought of due to her lifestyle and the pious women avoided her. She was a hungry soul, hungry for love and a meaningful relationship. After all, she had five previous marriages and they all had failed. Even in the present relationship, there was no clear commitment. They were just living together, or shacking up as the modern Pho might say. This Photini was a spiritual person, and knew her theology, but she realized that she was in the presence not only of a Jew, but a true Rabbi. The Master let her know that he was aware of her situation, and perhaps she switched to a religious discussion to avoid embarrassment.

Here is what impresses me about the Master's way of evangelizing Photini. Before any discussion began, he asked her for water. This is a curious way to evangelize someone, don't you think? No, it is the right way to reach out. You make a human contact; in this case a contact that acknowledges a shared human experience-thirst. Once this contact was made, the Lord let her know that he understood her thirst not only for water, but for love. o he told her that he had a different kind of water, living water, that would quench her thirsty heart. Brilliant!

So, I look at Pho and I wonder how I, an old man in black dress, can make contact and share a common human need. It's a challenge, for sure. I have to tell you of an event in my life that mirrors this idea. The family and I were visiting the inner harbor of Baltimore. Matushka and Elizabeth were off in some store and I was standing out side in my black priestly garb and hat. I look off into the distance and I saw a group of Goth kids coming my way. I smiled wondering how they would react. Sure enough one of them saw me and then told the rest. They stood there for a minute, and then suddenly ran up to me. "Man," they said, "This is radical! Where can I get a hat like that. And where did you get that robe? You are blacker than we are!" I can't say that I converted them, but we did have a short talk when I told them I was a priest so I tried to plant a few seeds.

Sometimes, it amazes me how conservative I have become, not so much in my dress as in my attitude. Is it just the way things go as you get older? I want younger people to behave themselves and act like me. I want them to come in and take care of things for me. I deserve it after all I have done and sacrificed. Let some young person clean the church, or cut the grass, or take care of the money, etc.

The problem is that while we throw open our doors, few young people are coming through those doors. This is a truth that we must hear. If we do not get out there among the Phos' of this world and bring to them the glory of Orthodoxy, we too will perish with time. Of course, God will not forget all that we have done, and closing is not necessarily defeat. After all, the Church that Paul founded in Corinth or Ephesus is no longer there, but we would never say that St. Paul was a failure.

What I am saying is that we must be ready to meet the Photinis of the world. We need to be where they are and learn how to speak to them. You remember the story of the strict nun who terrorized everyone in the Church about their behavior in the service. Then one day, a Photini walks in, and the nun rushes to her side. The congregation trembles at what Mother will say to her. Surprisingly, Mother smiles and puts her arm around her and quietly answers her questions. Later, when they get a chance, they question Mother about this. She replied, "With ourselves, we must be strict; but those outside of our faith, we must always show love."

My friends, let us learn from the Master. Everyday, as we live our normal lives, God brings people into our world with whom we share a common human need or experience. If we would recognize that God is at work in this, maybe we would not be so shy about it. We may fail many times, but we must learn how to speak to the Photinis that come our way, and offer them the living water of Holy Orthodoxy. It will be impossible to reach them if we sit in judgment of their piercings and tattoos. Photini is quick to sense rejection which to her is hypocrisy.

May the Master help us or this generation may be lost to us. We will age out until someone comes to buys our church building to start a business.

As I look at Pho, I wonder if I should ask her for a drink of water? This is an online journal of Father John Moses, an Orthodox priest of the Russian Orthodox Church.

The Sunday of the Samaritan Woman John 4:5-42

Then cometh He to a city of Samaria, which is called Sychar, near to the parcel of ground that Jacob gave to his son Joseph. Now Jacob's well was there. Jesus therefore, being wearied with His journey, sat thus on the well: and it was about the sixth hour. There cometh a woman of Samaria to draw water: Jesus saith unto her, Give me to drink. (For His disciples were gone away unto the city to buy meat.) Then saith the woman of Samaria unto Him, How is it that thou, being a Jew, askest drink of me, which am a woman of Samaria? for the Jews have no dealings with the Samaritans. Jesus answered and said unto her, If thou knewest the gift of God, and who it is that saith to thee, Give me to drink; thou wouldest have asked of Him, and He would have given thee living water. The woman saith unto Him, Sir, thou hast nothing to draw with, and the well is deep: from whence then hast Thou that living water? Art Thou greater than our father Jacob, which gave us the well, and drank thereof himself, and his children, and his cattle? Jesus answered and said unto her, Whosoever drinketh of this water shall thirst again: But whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water

springing up into everlasting life. The woman saith unto Him, Sir, give me this water, that I thirst not, neither come hither to draw. Jesus saith unto her, Go, call thy husband, and come hither. The woman answered and said, I have no husband. Jesus said unto her, Thou hast well said, I have no husband: For thou hast had five husbands; and he whom thou now hast is not thy husband: in that saidst thou truly. The woman saith unto Him, Sir, I perceive that thou art a prophet. Our fathers worshipped in this mountain; and ye say, that in Jerusalem is the place where men ought to worship. Jesus saith unto her, Woman, believe me, the hour cometh, when ye shall neither in this mountain, nor yet at Jerusalem, worship the Father. Ye worship ye know not what: we know what we worship: for salvation is of the Jews. But the hour cometh, and now is, when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth: for the Father seeketh such to worship Him. God is a Spirit: and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth. The woman saith unto Him, I know that Messias cometh, which is called Christ: when He is come, He will tell us all things. Jesus saith unto her, I that speak unto thee am He. And upon this came His disciples, and marvelled that He talked with the woman: yet no man said, What seekest thou? or, Why talkest thou with her? The woman then left her waterpot, and went her way into the city, and saith to the men, Come, see a man, which told me all things that ever I did: is not this the Christ? Then they went out of the city, and came unto Him. In the mean while His disciples prayed Him, saying, Master, eat. But He said unto them, I have meat to eat that ye know not of. Therefore said the disciples one to another, Hath any man brought Him ought to eat? Jesus saith unto them, My meat is to do the will of Him that sent me, and to finish His work. Say not ye, There are yet four months, and then cometh harvest? behold, I say unto you, Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest. And he that reapeth receiveth wages, and gathereth fruit unto life eternal: that both he that soweth and he that reapeth may rejoice together. And herein is that saying true, One soweth, and another reapeth. I sent you to reap that whereon ye bestowed no labour: other men laboured, and ye are entered into their labours. And many of the Samaritans of that city believed on him for the saying of the woman, which testified, He told me all that ever I did. So when the Samaritans were come unto Him, they besought Him that He would tarry with them: and He abode there two days. And many more believed because of his own word; And said unto the woman, Now we believe, not because of thy saying: for we have heard Him ourselves, and know that this is indeed the Christ, the Saviour of the world.(KJV)

This is the day to firmly reject our sins and to focus completely and attentively on Jesus Christ. The Samaritan woman's attentiveness to Christ brought others to Him and they became convinced He was the Saviour of the world.

The remaining time of our lives belong to the Lord Jesus Christ. We committed ourselves fully to the Lord Jesus Christ at Holy Baptism. Every moment of life after Baptism is to be lived faithfully in Christ.

The Lord, through His Holy Church, provides the guidance and nourishment to faithfully follow Jesus Christ throughout all of life. We need only be attentive and faithful.

When we fail, immediate repentance is necessary. The Lord Jesus Christ makes change possible even in the most sinful believers. The heart, mind and soul must accept change, reject sin, and begin anew in Christ.

The Church is full of joy in celebrating Christ's Resurrection at this time. We experience this joy to the fullest when we earnestly believe in Jesus Christ and live in Him at every moment.

The Holy Gospel guides and nourishes believers. Drink from the Holy Gospel, Drink from the words of Christ. Satisfy the longing of the soul and experience peace.
