Here we are, in a season of celebration, hospitality, and anticipation of things to come. We feasted on Thanksgiving, and then entered with joy and satisfaction into the Nativity fast. The Nativity fast is a gentle fast, with fish, wine, and oil on most days.

And the great feast of the Nativity of Christ which we approach is a profoundly joyous feast. A feast of the mystery of God, born as man. Yet a bright feast, a sweet feast. With the suddenness of the angelic proclamation to the shepherds, like the sudden appearance of Gabriel at the

Annunciation, the birth of Christ is simply given. And it brings joy and anticipation. We fast to focus ourselves spiritually. But the joy of the feast is already upon us.

It is a wide open invitation. All are invited. Nothing stops us from attending this great feast. There is no weakness, no poverty, no protocol that can keep us from this feast. Like the man who offered the banquet in this morning's gospel, the only things that keep us away from the feast are lame excuses. These are excuses that show our ignorance regarding the event that is about to happen.

From the mouth of God we hear the words, A certain man gave a great supper and invited many. But they all, with one accord, began to make excuses. My land, my cows, my wife, and so on. And the master said to his servants, Go into the highways and the hedges and compel all to come in, that my house may be filled. For I say to you that none of those who made excuses shall taste of my supper. May we all be freed from the excuses that keep us away from entering into the Nativity fast and the Nativity feast.

And today, halfway through the fast, we are also given a celebration of the patron saint of Nativity, the patron of gift-giving, of secret good works, and sneaking around in people's houses at night for righteousness' sake. Saint Nicholas the Wonderworker. In this great saint of the church we see the fruit of one who truly and wholly received Christ's invitation to dine.

He was a great teacher, a distributor of gifts to the poor, a defender of Orthodoxy against heresy, a defender of the innocent against false accusations, the patron of sailors and fishermen, for he, like Christ, also calms the seas for their protection. Such were his good works within the community of believers that once, when Saint Nicholas was considering retiring to a life of silence and solitude, a voice from on high was heard saying to him, "Nicholas, set about your work among the people if you desire to receive a crown from me". That would be motivating.

Almost immediately after taking up his work among the people again, he was chosen bishop of Myra in Lycia, just in time to begin a defense of the church against the persecutions of Diocletian and Maximian. Later, he struggled mightily against the Arian heresy at the first ecumenical council, himself striking Arius in order to silence his blasphemy. Because of this, he was removed from the council and stripped of his duties as bishop.

But, as the prologue says, Christ and the Theotokos appeared to several of the chief bishops and showed their sympathy for Nicholas, and he was restored. Tonight, after Vespers, we celebrate the coming of Nativity with our annual Christmas program. It is always fun for children, for all of us, and a good opportunity for non-Orthodox friends to meet the parish

community. So come and celebrate. No excuses. And if you are good, I even heard that St. Nicholas himself just may be there.

When I first came to understand personally who St. Nicholas was, I was very happy to find out that Santa Claus really existed, that my childhood fondness for someone who would sneak into my house to give me a gift was not wasted. And I'm pretty sure myself that St. Nicholas is the tooth fairy, too. Makes sense, doesn't it? But to be honest, deep in my heart, deep in my heart, I had a hard time placing St. Nicholas among my own patron saints.

So many years of marketing gimmicks, silly red men in suits, reindeers, elves, and the spirit of materialism had clouded my mind and my heart. Other saints leapt right off the pages and into my life. But my link with St. Nicholas was stymied. I could see him clearly in history, but not in my life. Then in 1988, along with many others from our parish community, I made my first Orthodox pilgrimage. It was to Russia for the millennial celebration of Orthodoxy there.

And among all the wonders and riches of Russian Orthodoxy, I was struck with how popular St. Nicholas was. St. Nicholas churches, St. Nicholas monasteries, icons in every church and every home. And I began to realize that this was a real saint. This was a man, a real Christian man, who lived a real life of Christian faith and works, a pillar of greatness in the church. And he waited for me to call upon him, as all saints do, as all saints do. And recently I stopped and took a good look at the Orthodox understanding of communion of the saints for our catechism class.

There are many theological truths about the unity of the church, both militant and triumphant, living and departed, on earth and in heaven. We have a strong apologetic against the West's misunderstanding or total abandonment of the saints. But for me, looking at these things, it all came down to one profound thing. God does not change. God does not change. Nor does he call us to anything that passes away.

There is no dichotomy or dualism in his relationship with us. No set of conditions that work here on earth temporarily that will be replaced by separate conditions in heaven. What God offers us today, what we are called to do today, the life given to the saints of God, that which St. Nicholas accepted from God and became by the power of the Holy Spirit, all of these things are the same. They are the beginnings of eternity. They are the seeds of paradise, the first days, the first days of immortality. And what God gives is good, and it does not pass away.

Love, compassion, charity, intercession, virtue, every gift of God that begins here will endure forever. Purified? Yes. Sanctified? Yes. Perfected in Christ? Yes. But the seeds planted and nurtured in us and by us will

endure eternally. And this is exactly why we have communion with all the members of Christ's body, living and departed.

We are one in Christ and unified by life in Him. One God, one family, one Father, one communion. And having passed through the veil of death into the mystical presence of God, the saints don't stop doing what Christ called them and us to do.

In 2 Thessalonians, Colossians, and Corinthians, we see that on earth the holy apostles hoped and prayed for all people. Quote, "we also pray always for you that our God would count you worthy of this calling. We do not cease to pray for you and to ask that you might be filled with the knowledge of His will. And this also we pray for, even your perfection. We do not cease to pray for you", Saint Paul says to the Christians on earth. And if the prayer of the apostle on earth was unceasing, how is it possible that it should cease when they are absent from the body and present with the Lord? For Saint Paul tells us, "love never fails. But where there are prophecies, they will fail. Where there are tongues, they will cease. Where there is knowledge, it will vanish away. But love never fails".

If the saints while on earth had love for people, and by this love which is in Christ they obtained eternal life, when they passed over in love from death into life, they are not deprived of this love for people, but continue to possess it. If the saints had compassion for people on earth, if they had an unfailing desire for their salvation, if they had prayer for them before God, if here they heard and accepted requests for prayer, if they knew the needs and deeds of men, even those that are hidden and secret, and were able to help the people by the power of grace granted them by God, then they will lose none of these things, none of these abilities, when they are absent from the body and present with the Lord.

When in Russia, I was very blessed to gain a better understanding of St. Nicholas, for I wanted him to be freed of the red suits and reindeer in my mind. I wanted to call upon him as one of my intercessors before God, but above and beyond all his churches, all his monasteries, all his icons that I saw, I was most affected when I met him. I don't even remember what church or monastery it was, perhaps St. Nicholas Skete, but we were led downstairs into the lower church, most big churches abroad, especially in Russia, have an upper and lower church, one they use in the winter and one they use in the summer, and it was unbelievably beautiful down there, like so many other churches we'd seen.

We were led across the church to near the base of one of the large columns in the middle of the church, our guide pointed, and there, hanging

about six or seven feet off the ground, was a very large, very beautiful icon of St. Nicholas, maybe three or four feet tall. And I thought, wow, here we go again. St. Nicholas, you are everywhere. But this icon was different from the others that I had seen. It had little stairs leading up to it, and a little platform, and then steps going down the other side. And I thought at first it was a little funny that they had gone through all the trouble to build steps up to the icon rather than just putting the icon lower.

You know, practical American mind. But what I did not realize was that this icon was worthy of elevation. A little woman went up the steps, she made her low bows, opened the large glass case that encased the icon, and there he was, St. Nicholas himself. A relic as big as my hand. His flesh, the man, the saint. Saint Nicholas of Myra, it hit me, was right there. And when I ascended, when my turn came to ascend that little stairway to him, I tell you it was better than any kid's dream of sitting in Santa's lap. The scent of his sanctified body poured out of the giant relic and filled the entire area. His 1700-year-old body delivered sweetness to my nose and to my soul.

And when I breathed it in and I prayed, St. Nicholas, pray to God for us, the little red suits and reindeer were gone. The man stuck in history up until that point was gone. For me, I knew that as I was struggling to come to find St. Nicholas in my life, here, with an unexpected invitation like the invitation we heard in the gospel today, he had found me.

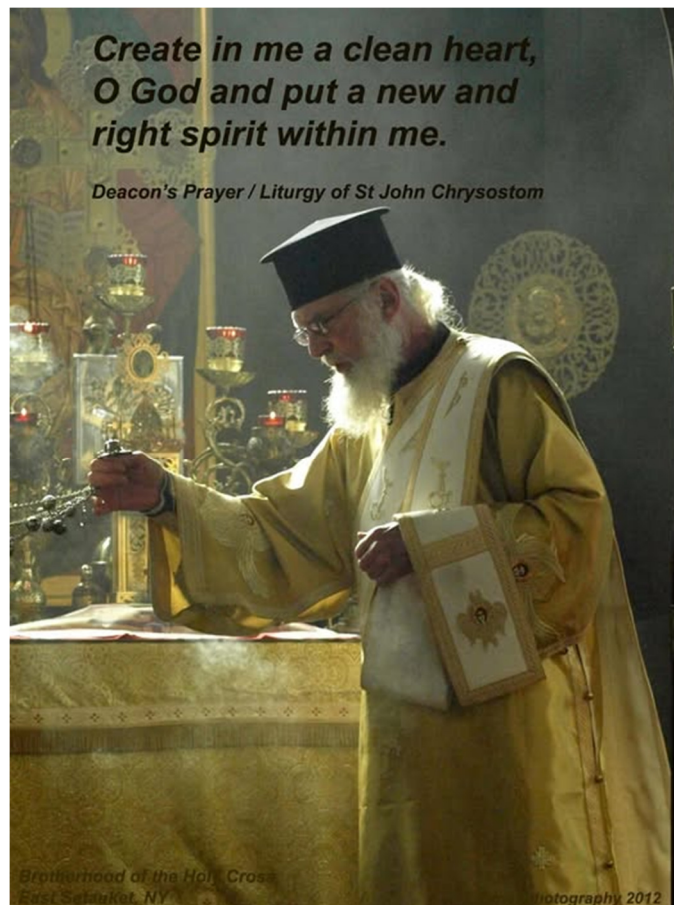
And we are all invited to this banquet of the saints. We are all invited to the banquet of the Feast of Nativity, which is the first feast, remember this, in our life today, in these weeks right now, in the present moment, this is the first feast of an eternal celebration. For as St. Paul said to the Ephesians and St. Nicholas and all the saints say to us today, "So then, you are no longer strangers and sojourners, but you are fellow citizens with the saints and of the household of God".

Saint Innocent of Moscow (Veniaminov) explained to his parishioners how to find the way to The Kingdom of Heaven, in parables.

Imagine that, unexpectedly, you suddenly find yourself the sole heir of a wealthy distant relative. Before his death, this relative bequeathed to you his luxurious dacha on the top of a picturesque mountain.

Loving his solitude, this relative did not build a road to his dacha, but rather walked there himself along a path. To help you take possession of the dacha, he left you a map of the mountain, marking the necessary path on it. Thus, to reach the bequeathed dacha, you must follow the path marked by your loving relative.

Something similar must be done for us who wish to reach the heavenly abode prepared for us by the Lord Jesus Christ. We must thoroughly understand the path that leads there, how not to lose our way, what to beware of, and so on.

Our map is the Holy Scriptures and Orthodox books; the foresters are the shepherds of the Church, whose duty it is to assist the faithful and guide them toward paradise. Provisions are God's grace, strengthening our spiritual strength.

Perhaps in places the path leading to paradise will prove narrow, overgrown with bushes, and difficult to navigate, while other paths will seem wider and more comfortable. But it's best not to trust appearances. The Lord Jesus Christ and the apostles repeatedly warned that only one path, the one indicated in the Gospel, leads to the Kingdom of Heaven.
